MUTEH has been CoC-funded since 2008. Since that time, the number of CoC projects has grown both in size and scope. MUTEH has also increased its federal grant portfolio to include other federal funds from multiple grants through the VA. MUTEH’s programming has also included appropriations from the State legislature (a dynamic rarely seen in Mississippi) and an array of city/state and private funding (from individuals, community organizations, and foundations). The growth of the CoC-funding has enabled MUTEH to work with HMIS, CoC-RRH, CoC Planning, CES, and CoC-PSH programming. The diversity of MUTEH’s programming brings considerable resources to meet the unique needs of a diverse population across a large rural geography. MUTEH’s team has diligently followed the steps outlined by the USICH and its series of Federal Strategic Plans to End Homelessness. This work has led to an effective end to Veteran Homelessness in the CoC in 2018, and MUTEH (with our many partners) has striven to maintain that effective end designation with success in the years since 2018. Further, more recently, MUTEH’s CoC programs significantly contributed to significant reductions in chronic homelessness as each month (over the past 2 years) MUTEH houses more than 50% of all homeless persons housed through the CES.

To ensure the fidelity of the CES, MUTEH staffers lead weekly/biweekly outreach opportunities across the CoC with unsheltered homeless persons being case-managed out of homelessness and their data tracked in real-time. MUTEH works with survivors of domestic violence through a current CoC-funded TH-RRH program for that population. This program has allowed for MUTEH to coordinate with the state’s other VSP’s, the Attorney General’s Office Domestic Violence unit, and law enforcement, to ensure that survivors of both domestic violence and human trafficking have safe, stable housing.

Finally, with a majority BIPOC board, a fully diverse leadership team, and a staff that fully reflects the racial makeup of the population it serves, MUTEH is well established to continue its great work with CoC-funding.

2. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) experience in leveraging Federal, State, local and private sector funds.

For State and Federal: In past years, MUTEH has worked with the MS Home Corporation and the MS Department of Mental Health, to house individuals and families that are experiencing homelessness and have been hospitalized (or diagnosed) with a serious mental illness. That grant totaled more than \$1.1M per year and attempted to serve 200 households. MUTEH has maintained that grant for seven years. MUTEH also managed two different HOPWA grants from two different funding entities (the City of Jackson, MS, and MS Home Corp.). These two HOPWA grants have seen MUTEH expend more than \$4M in those contracts. MUTEH also receives a slate of SSVF grants from the VA (providing Shallow Subsidy, Legal Services, Healthcare Navigation, Rapid Resolution, Homelessness Prevention, and Rapid Rehousing).

For Local: MUTEH maintains a contract with the City of Tupelo to coordinate their homelessness response (through outreach, data collection/reporting, housing, and strategic planning). This contract also has MUTEH lead a Mayor’s Taskforce. The taskforce brings together different city departments (police, code compliance), nonprofit service providers (shelter, food pantries, etc), churches, and community advocates. These funds are used to match the CoC-funded services provided in that area.

For Private Sector Funds: MUTEH was awarded a grant from the Bezos Day 1 Families Fund in 2021. It was a \$2.5M grant over 5 years to serve families with children at risk of homelessness and those experiencing homelessness. This grant has been used to develop affordable housing, provide rental and utility assistance, and to pay for the many needs that public funding is not available to pay, all for the target population.

3. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) financial management structure.

MUTEH uses a web-based financial software package developed by SAGE, Inc. The version we have used for the past 13 years is called MAS200. This accounting system allows for separation of funds and tracking of expenditures based on GAAP policies. The system allows us to report on budget vs. actual expenditures, accrual of expenditures and timely recording of revenues. Our staff are trained and experienced with the financial system. Monitors and auditors are afforded the ability to review and report based on data captured by the financial software. We use secure, individual log in information only available to respective fiscal staff that have received training and approval to access the modules in MAS200.

MUTEH's Chief Financial Officer directs the fiscal team (comprised of 3 additional employees). The CFO collaborates with fiscal officers to ensure that the organization's fiscal procedures are followed in managing grant funds. The capacity of our staff allows for separation of duties and dual control as outlined by GAAP policies. Further, the CFO reports to MUTEH's Board of Directors in each board meeting to review finance reports in conjunction with the board Secretary/Treasurer. Lastly, MUTEH's annual budget requires that an annual A133 audit be completed. MUTEH’s fiscal procedures outline those processes and the involvement of the board throughout the project.

3B. Project Description

1. Provide a description that addresses the entire scope of the proposed project.

The mission of our A New Hope program is to offer safe housing to survivors of domestic violence and human trafficking while providing the many supports necessary to assist clients in their path to recovery. Domestic violence and human trafficking have become national crises in recent years, and these dynamics are as prevalent in our Mississippi CoC coverage area as they are in any other state. According to domesticviolence.org, in Mississippi, over 39% of women and over 31% of men claim to have experienced physical, sexual or stalking abuse from an intimate partner in their lifetime, and that percentage is likely underreported. Further, with the trends in our state being that ESG is funding less and less DV services, this leaves many victims of DV with the terrible situation of staying with an abuser because there is no safe, accessible escape. Regarding human trafficking (of which there are 4M victims each year), the lack of housing available for that population is staggering and victims identified by law enforcement are only connected with distant shelter options (a problem with rural CoC's). With MUTEH's proposed project, the housing is flexible to meet the security, size, and location requirements that are presented by each unique client. No longer will survivors of DV or human trafficking be forced to travel long distances only to stay in a shelter setting with little to no autonomy. Now there is a program that is pliable to each client's distinct needs.

As law enforcement at the local, state, and federal level disrupt human trafficking, MUTEH stands ready to take those victims and place them in community-based housing. MUTEH has networked with law enforcement teams and victim advocacy centers around the state, to develop an intake process for any victim of DV or human trafficking. Furthermore, MUTEH has worked with a network of landlords to provide a vast number of housing options for victims and their partners or dependent children. The referral and intake process between law enforcement and MUTEH will lead to victims being quickly placed in a home of their own. MUTEH has worked with experts in safety in victim service provision to ensure that the housing is kept confidential and is safe for each client.

The program then addresses the many effects that victims experience. MUTEH works closely with mental health services to ensure that victims are provided in-home mental healthcare as they choose. Additionally, through partnerships with health clinics across the coverage area, MUTEH ensures that newly housed clients go through a health screening that will include an HIV test with other screenings. Finally, the client will be connected with a case manager that will walk them through their time in the program. MUTEH's case managers are experts in evidence-based practices such as critical time intervention case management and motivational interviewing. The case manager will utilize these practices to address the challenges that the client will face in becoming self-sufficient (housing maintenance, employment, budgeting). MUTEH tracks all of the pertinent client dynamics in a comparable HMIS system.

4A. Supportive Services for Participants

1. Describe how program participants will be assisted to obtain and remain in permanent housing.

The project aims to serve 15 households each program year, and each assisted household is expected to obtain and remain in permanent housing. By working with other DV victim service providers, human trafficking task forces, law enforcement, and the CES of the CoC, MUTEH will ensure that this program is integrated into the referral systems of each aforementioned entity/system. Law enforcement will connect trafficking victims with housing in the moments they are encountered. Victims of human trafficking should only interact with law enforcement as necessary to connect to services. There will be a nurse practitioner available for a health assessment, and there will also be a "victim advocate" present as well to take over the conversation with the referral. The victim advocate meets with the victim separate from law enforcement to discuss housing and the new client's goals. MUTEH ensures that, in its referral protocols, victims have choice in housing while maintaining their safety. Partnerships with (and within) the DV Coalition allow for any survivors of DV to be referred quickly and safely to the project. It is anticipated that this project will serve clients that choose to avoid shelter options and would prefer community-based housing.

MUTEH's focus is the housing component. We house our clients first while ensuring their safety. Throughout that time, we are assessing the client's situation, and hearing from them on what their goals are in our program. We then focus on mental health, healthcare, credit repair, schooling for children as necessary, legal services (ie. an expungement may be helpful), parenting classes, financial curriculum, and job training. MUTEH employs attorneys, social workers, and healthcare navigators, to accomplish much of this in-house, but the most valuable members on our team are those with lived experience. Our team members with lived experience utilize a connectedness to the client that has produced great outcomes and guides our programming. Finally, MUTEH has MOU partnerships with seven regional housing authorities that maintain both mainstream and EHV vouchers. This referral process will provide clients long term housing as needed when their time in the program ends. MUTEH has worked with housing authorities to ensure that all requirements/inspections are included in the housing process resulting in clients transitioning in place.

2. Describe the specific plan to coordinate and integrate with other mainstream health, social services, and employment programs for which program participants may be eligible.

MUTEH’s extensive relationships with both healthcare and mental health service providers across the state guarantees that clients will be rapidly connected to healthcare and mental health professionals. MUTEH employs licensed masters level social workers to serve as case managers to guarantee each client is appropriately assessed and connected to relevant services. MUTEH partners with the MS Dept. of Employment Services (MDES) and utilizes our State's WIN Job Centers. In conjunction with MDES, MUTEH works with workforce development programs based in the Planning & Development Districts within the CoC. Given our state funded mental health housing program, MUTEH enjoys rich partnerships with community mental health centers, crisis stabilization units, mobile crisis response teams, PACT teams, and other community-based treatment options. Better yet, MUTEH staff are trained on how to evaluate and when to refer to the necessary mental health service to aid and not exasperate the client. MUTEH's team will work with clients directly on budgeting and financial management, but we also refer to a diverse group of providers for financial literacy, banking, credit repair, and paths to home ownership.

Utilizing the valuable relationships to partner agencies, MUTEH's team (consisting of persons with lived experience) is then permitted to focus on other areas of case management: employment, budgeting, hygiene, education, connection to friends/family (as it's determined safe), childcare, and domestic services.

- Housing Fees. Grant funds can be used to pay fees associated with getting survivors into a safe unit via emergency transfer(s), including but not limited to application fees, broker fees, holding fees, trash fees, pet fees where the person believes they need their pet to be safe, etc.
- Case Management. Grant funds can be used to pay staff time necessary to assess, coordinate, and implement emergency transfer(s).
- Housing Navigation. Grant funds can be used to pay staff time necessary to identify safe units and facilitate moves into housing for survivors through emergency transfer(s).
- Technology to make an available unit safe. Grant funds can be used to pay for technology that the individual believes is needed to make the unit safe, including but not limited to doorbell cameras, security systems, phone, and internet service when necessary to support security systems for the unit, etc.

B. VAWA Confidentiality Requirements. Examples of eligible costs for ensuring compliance with VAWA confidentiality requirements include:

- Monitoring and evaluating compliance.
- Developing and implementing strategies for corrective actions and remedies to ensure compliance.

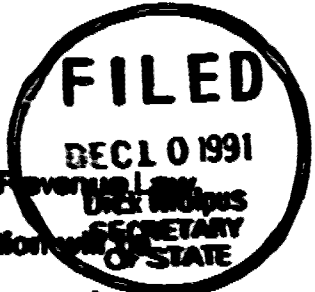
